Anna School Bell... 193 Years of History

It was in the fall when they hung her. The year was 1828. Allen Trimble was Governor of Ohio. John Quincy Adams was President of the United States. And on Saturday, October 25th to be exact, they rang her for the first time. One hundred

in Springfield. She was cast by John Wilbank. He made bells and was a big deal in his field. He once owned the cracked Liberty Bell which was given to him in exchange for casting a new bell for Independence Hall. He made the bell I'm talking about. The bell that hangs at the southwest corner of Anna High School.

It was Springfield's first bell, and her 200 pounds hung proudly from the specially made cupola extending above the second story of their courthouse from 1828 until 1878 where it was the duty of the jailer to ring her at 6:00 in the morning and at 9:00 in the evening.

In 1878, the Clark County Courthouse, including the bell, was sold for \$55.99 and then torn down. The purchaser, Judge Littler, entrusted the bell to the Commissioners to preserve as a relic. And then it disappeared -stolen after two or three years of resting in the county storage lot.



Somehow the bell made its way to Toledo and on November 3rd, 1883, the Treasurer of the Anna School District paid junk dealer P Smith and Company \$60.00 for the bell. Anna Schools had only existed for 16 years at the time.

In 1929, Anna School Superintendent F. K. Stafford, on a visit to the Clark County Museum, mentioned that the bell on the roof of the Anna school house was the bell that had been cast for Clark County back in 1828. It didn't take long – less than a year in fact – for the Clark County Historical Society to make the first of many offers to purchase the bell.

In 1938, the school board wrote "Why should we

sell it? Has not the bell won for itself sentimental regards of hundreds of pupils who, in the last 50 years, have graduated from the Anna school?" Later the School Board wrote, "We just think we will keep the bell for a while at least." then "Maybe – well possibly some day we will sell it, and then Clark County will have the first chance." And after the earthquakes "it was decided to keep the old bell. Time might make changes." And after approaches from Clark County in 2003 and 2015, "We prefer to keep it at this time."

From 1938 until the latest renovations, the bell sat on the roof of the high school, completely unprotected from the elements. For many years, she rang on the first school day. In recent times and to protect her, the tradition stopped. Many either forgot or never

knew the bell even existed.

As a testament to the history and tradition of the Anna Local School District, she now hangs protected and secured in a tower welcoming future generations to our school building and honoring those who leave. She is tough. Hit by lightning while hanging in Springfield and having survived the earthquakes in Anna, she remains cherished by both communities – 50 years in Springfield and 138 years – in Anna. One hundred thirty-eight years and counting.
